### Preparing Your 3MT Slide

- Assume that you are presenting to a lay audience
- ONE single static PowerPoint slide is permitted
  - o No slide transitions, animations, or 'movement' of any description are permitted
  - o No additional electronic media (eg. video/sound files) are permitted
  - o No additional props (eg. costumes, musical instruments, etc.) are permitted
- Presentations are to be spoken word (eg. no poems, songs, etc.)
- Your slide is to be presented from the beginning of your oration
- Presentations are considered to have commenced when a presenter starts their presentation through either movement or speech

# Writing Your 3MT (from University of Queensland guidelines)

- Write for your audience
  - o Avoid jargon and academic language assume that you are presenting to a lay audience
  - o Explain concepts and people important to your research
  - o Imagine that you are explaining your research to a close friend or fellow student from another field
  - o Do not dumb down or devalue your research, what you are doing is exciting and you should convey enthusiasm for your subject
- Have a clear outcome in mind
  - o Know what you want your audience to take away from your presentation
  - o Ideally, you'd like the audience to leave with an understanding of what you are doing and why you're doing it
- What not to do
  - o Do not write your presentation like an academic paper
  - o Use shorter words, shorter sentences, and shorter paragraphs
  - o You can use humor, but be careful not to dumb down your presentation
- Revise
  - o Proof your presentation by reading it aloud
  - o Time yourself
  - o Give your presentation to someone who can provide feedback, whether a friend or colleague, or someone in your department
    - After presenting, ask if this person can understand what your research is and why it is important

# Miscellaneous Suggestions

- Review the <u>3MT FAQ page</u> from University of Queensland
- SIMPLICITY IS KEY. Keep to the point, and don't try to cover too many things
- Use your voice to communicate clearly
- Speak loudly, slowly and clearly
  - o Use pauses do not be afraid of short periods of silence
- Have good posture
  - o Stand straight and comfortably, do not slouch or shuffle around.
- Dealing with nervousness
  - o Smile! Your audience will react warmly to you if you smile and at least look relaxed
  - o Treat your audience like friends
  - o Breathe deeply. It will calm you down and help to control the slight shaking that you might get in your hands and your voice
  - o Be organized. If you are well organized, your task will be easier
  - o Slow down! When people are nervous, they tend to get confused easily. Make use of pauses: force yourself to stop at the end of a sentence, take a breath, and think before you continue.

### CATEGORY 1: COMPREHENSION AND CONTENT

Y/N	Did the presentation provide an understanding of the background and significance to the research question being addressed while explaining terminology and avoiding jargon?
Y/N	Did the presentation clearly describe the impact and/or results of the research, including conclusions and outcomes?
Y/N	Did the presentation follow a clear and logical sequence?
Y/N	Was the thesis topic, research significance, results/impact and outcomes communicated in language appropriate to a non-specialist audience?
Y/N	Did the presenter spend adequate time on each element of their presentation - or did they elaborate for too long on one aspect or was the presentation rushed?

### CATEGORY 2: ENGAGEMENT AND COMMUNICATION

Strong 7 6 5 4 3 2 1 Weak

Y/N	Did the oration make the audience want to know more?
Y/N	Was the presenter careful not to trivialise or generalise their research?
Y/N	Did the presenter convey enthusiasm for their research?
Y/N	Did the presenter capture and maintain their audience's attention?
Y/N	Did the speaker have sufficient stage presence, eye contact and vocal range; maintain a steady pace,
	and have a confident stance?
Y/N	Did the PowerPoint slide enhance the presentation - was it clear, legible, and concise?
